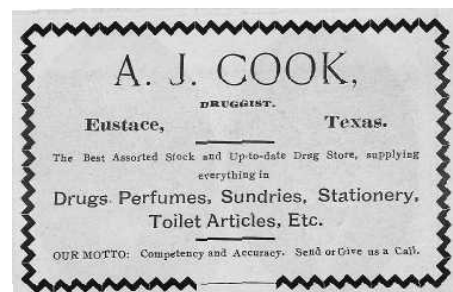

Eustace, Henderson County, Texas, 1903

(In this issue we have focused on Eustace, Texas, its origins and its citizens of 1903 as reported by *The Southland*, a monthly newspaper of Waco, Texas, in the February issue of that year. The biographical subjects were still alive at that time. ED.)

Eustace was founded in about 1901 and named for Captain Williamson Tomlin Eustace of Athens. It was established on the completion of the T & N O Railroad to that point. In 1903 it was described as a "thriving little city with some dozen businesses including a gin, lumber yard, school, shops, restaurant, etc. Being situated in a good country and at a sufficient distance from other centers, it will no doubt make a good town and will become quite conclusive to the development of that excellent portion of Henderson Co.

"The young town ... is surrounded with a fine quality of soil well adapted to all kinds of truck and fruit growing. Well timbered with hickory, blackjack and shumake which indicate the best soil, being a black loamy nature and 'tis only a matter of short time when business men will be awakened to this section of the county and truck farming and fruit growing will be the chief industries. ... Land is cheap but advancing in price. Home seekers will do well to investigate these lands and prices."

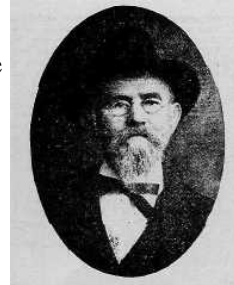
The Root Seekers Genealogical Society is organized as a nonprofit, educational organization, managed by a Board of Directors. Its purpose is to further the development of genealogical research and to act as a training agency for people interested in genealogical research, to acquire a collection of genealogical and historical material, and to make the information available to others doing genealogical research.

Annual membership dues shall be \$12.00 for an individual, \$15.00 for a family, and \$5.00 for full time students. For those seeking a life membership for an individual under age 60, the fee shall be \$150.00; for a family under age 60, \$200.00. For those between age 60 and 70, a single membership shall be \$100.00; for a family, regardless of the spouse's age, \$125.00. For those over age 70, a single membership shall be \$50.00; for a family, regardless of the spouse's age, \$65.00.

Regular meetings of the society are on the third Monday of each month at 7:00 PM, except December, in the Tri-County Library on Main St., Mabank, Texas.

Williamson Tomlin Eustace

In the early days of Virginia, John Eustace came from England and settled in Lancaster, near the village of Kilmarnock. He married there and reared one son, William Conway Eustace, who in turn, grew up, married and reared a family and died on the old homestead known as Wingville in 1856. Williamson Tomlin Eustace was the youngest of four children by a first marriage. The father being twice married. Williamson was born in Lancaster

County, Virginia, 24 August 1845. His father was an extensive planter and slave holder so that his childhood was surrounded with affluence. He was educated at the Upperville Military Academy and was an advanced student in this institution when the Civil War began. He at once left school and enlisted in his country's cause in the 47th Virginia Regiment and after two years was transferred to the 1st Richmond Howitzer where he remained until the surrender at Appomattox. He served through the entire war and was in all the principal engagements of the Army of Northern Virginia. He served under Beauregard Johnson and Lee. He was justly proud of his war record. (At the time of the writing of the original article in 1903, Capt. Eustace was still alive and the verb "was" was written as "is." ED) "After the war the Negroes were freed and the family fortune swept away and young Eustace as with a thousand others was left on his own resources. He surveyed the field, nerved himself for the battle of life and determined to come west."

He was in Shreveport, Louisiana, in May 1865 and stayed there for two years until coming to Tyler for a few months and then on to Henderson County where he remained for the rest of his life. He was a teacher, District Clerk, County Clerk and in 1888 he was elected County Superintendent.

In 1890, because of poor eyesight, he withdrew from public service to practice law. After two years, however, in spite of his handicap, he was elected city assessor and collector of taxes for Athens and was appointed Recorder and City Secretary.

Judge Eustace was twice married but had no children. He first married Miss Margaret Davis, the daughter of John L. Davis. She died after 14 years of marriage. Later he married Miss Mattie E. Mitcham, the daughter of Jas. A. Mitcham, one of the oldest pioneers in Henderson County.

He was never defeated for office and enjoyed all the honors a county could bestow.

Dr. L. L. Cockerell

Dr. L. L. Cockerell was born in Kaufman County, June 4, 1880. Like many professional men at the turn of the century, he had experience on a farm. He attended public school throughout his childhood. At eighteen, he entered the medical school at Memphis, Tennessee, and after attending two other medical schools and graduating in 1901 he settled in Eustace, Texas. In January 1902 he married Miss Lizzie Earnest of Ellis County. He had one son by 1903 and enjoyed a "lucrative" practice.

G. J. Cook

G. J. Cook was born in Tarrant County, Texas, 18 January 1867. In 1869 his father moved to Henderson County where the young Cook was reared on a farm while attending the public schools of the county. At twenty-five, he entered the mercantile business in Payne Springs, also in Henderson County. After nine years of successful experience, Mr. Cook moved to the railroad town of Eustace and entered into a partnership with S.

S. C. Campbell

In 1845 Elijah Campbell came from Alabama to Anderson Co., Texas. In 1853 was married to Miss Eliza Shockley, in 1860 moved to Smith County where he was still living in 1902. They had 10 children, 3 girls and 7 boys. The subject of this sketch, S. C. Campbell was born April 12, 1869, in Smith County. He was reared on the farm, remained on the farm until he reached the age of 21, during which time he had the advantage of the public schools of this country. At the age of 21 he entered Summer Hill select School of Omen, Smith County. Being limited in means, he taught at intervals thus enabling him to prosecute his studies. In the spring of 1897 he graduated. He chose the profession of teaching. After having taught 6 years in Smith County and 4 years in Henderson County, he resigned the school room. In October 1902, he entered the mercantile business in the thriving little town of Eustace. On the 8th of December 1902 he formed a partnership with G. J. Cook in General merchandise. (*The Southland*, February 1903)

George C. Osburn

Geo. C. Osburn was born in Neches, Anderson County, Texas. He was the son of Geo. C. Osburn, Sr., ex-sheriff of Henderson County and the brother of Fred and J. T. Osburn who are well known among railroad men. The latter were agents on the Cotton Belt at Wolf City. The subject of this sketch was educated at Athens High School. For three years he lived in Eldy, Texas, and was engaged in the lumber business. He was, in 1903, the popular agent for the T. & N. O. at Eustace. On March 6, 1901 he married Miss Ida May Daniel of Plano, Texas. Their fortune increased and their home was made happier by the coming of a daughter, Leach, named for the popular dispatcher of the T. & N. O. Railway. The railroad took great pride in its building, depots, section houses, etc. The *Southland* in its February 1903 issue said of the T. & N. O. Railroad, "Many of its agents are wide-awake and enterprising people."

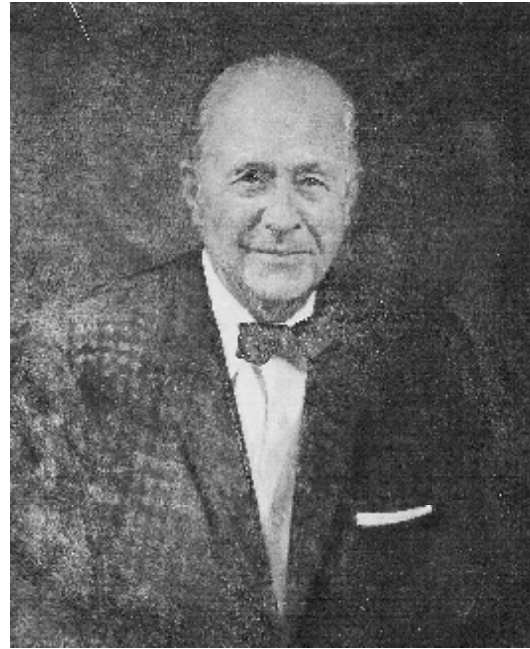
Who is Joe B. Hogsett?

The dam/spillway for Cedar Creek Lake on Highway 274 is named for this man; yet no one seems to know much about him. I knew Joe B. Hogsett had to be in my line somewhere. I have learned finally that his Grandfather and my 5th GGrandfather were brothers. My 5th GGrandfather was William Hogshead, b.1812. He died in the Mexican War of 1846. Joe B. Hogsett's grandfather was Alexander Hogshead, b.1814. He was a farmer and lived and died in Anderson County, Tennessee. Both William and Alexander were the sons of William Hogshead who was one of the first attorneys of Anderson County, Tennessee, and who was once Commonwealth Attorney of Anderson County. In 1798 he married Ann Kirkpatrick/Kilpatrick. Both were born in Anderson County, Tennessee.

William who died during the Mexican War had married Margaret who with her SIX children moved to Texas from Anderson County, Tennessee, between 1850 & 1853 and settled in Hopkins County. She married Richard Hamilton and is on the 1860 census for Titus County, Texas. She had two sons by Richard Hamilton. All but one of the Hogsett children were married by that time and stayed in Hopkins County. The children of these both Alexander and William Hogshead changed the name from Hogshead to Hogsett after the move to Texas. My line seems to bounce back and forth on the names as if they could not make up their minds which name they wanted to use.

Alexander Hogshead had two sons; the oldest was William D. who was killed in the state of Kansas attempting to arrest a man. His youngest was Jonathan Young Hogsett, b. 1843, who moved to Texas at the age of 16. At 18 he enlisted in Company K, 5th Tex. Vol. Cav. Regt., Sibley's Brigade in San Antonio, Texas, at the beginning of the Civil War. After the war he went back to Anderson County, Tennessee, to take care of his aging father and to study law. His father died in March of 1869 and in November of that year he married Anna M. Long while still in Tennessee. I believe he moved his wife, children and mother Harriet to Texas and settled in Fort Worth in the early 1870's. I have found him on the Fort Worth city directory for the years of 1877, 78 and 79. He was one of the city's leading attorneys and a partner in the law firm of Hanna & Hogsett. Later he became a Judge and drew up the first city charter for Fort Worth. Jonathan died in 1909. He fathered seven children

and the youngest was Joe B. Hogsett.

Joe Brather Hogsett was born October 26, 1883. He married Marguerite Cantey and had two daughters, Anna Melissa who is called Chissa and Marguerite who now lives in New Mexico. Chissa is 85 years young and I have spoken to her on the telephone. She says her father was a Civil Engineer who held that elected office longer than any other official in Tarrant County. He was on the Board of Directors of the Tarrant County Water Board for 42 years from 1929 to 1971. He was President of the Board from 1942 to 1971. He was very concerned about the conservation of water in Texas. While he was president of the board he helped create Eagle Mountain Lake, Lake Bridgeport, Lake Worth and Cedar Creek Lake. He was responsible for 27 miles of floodway through Fort Worth. Chissa remembers that all of the family and others rode a bus to Cedar Creek Lake for his last official act to push the button that officially opened Cedar Creek Lake. Joe B. Hogsett died in 1980 and was buried in the Historic Oakwood Cemetery of Fort Worth close to his parents.

They Heard the Call: "G T T"

During the 1800s, both before and after the Civil War, neighbors would find the next farm vacant with a note posted on the door: G T T (Gone to Texas). This issue includes four articles submitted by Nina Hendricks which relate her ancestors' move to Texas from Tennessee and Alabama. They include "Who is Joe B. Hogsett?," "The William and Margaret Hoghead/Hogsett Family," "Three Brothers from Alabama," "and "James O. and Mary Jane Hamill ." With the exception of the 1924 Kaufman Scholastic Census and possibly the enumeration of the Oaklawn Cemetery of Mabank, these articles are in keeping with the aim of making this issue one devoted to Henderson County. ED

James O. and Mary Jane Hogsett Hamill

James O. Hamill of Hopkins County, Texas, married Mary (Molly) Jane Hogsett, daughter of William Hoghead and Margaret Ann R. Veal on April 10, 1859. He was born in Carroll County, Tennessee, in 1834 and Mary was born April 30, 1837, in Knox County, Tennessee. James was the son of Joseph Wesley Harvey Hamill and Caroline A. (possible last name of Sargent). Harvey Hamill was one of the first Methodist Preachers at the new location of the Church at Old Sattilo.

James enlisted in the Confederate Army as a private at Coffeerville, Texas, on April 1, 1862. He served with Co. E. 18th Texas Infantry, Ochiltree's Brigade, Captain William R. Buford's Company. His age at the time was given as 28 years. At the time he joined the army James and Mary had two daughters. Saletha Amelia and Lula (Lou) Martha both were born at Pine Forest, Texas.

On November 6, 1862, a certificate of discharge was approved for disability. His military papers said that because of epileptic fits of long standing he was entitled to a discharge. I have found from other sources that several men died from the measles, fever and other diseases at Camp Nelson, Arkansas, where James Hamill was stationed at the time.

On February 15, 1863, in Upshur County, Texas, James reenlisted with Capt. Coppedge. At this time his age was given as 29 years old and he was described as having blue eyes, auburn hair, fair complexion and being 6 ft. 2 1/2 inches tall. His occupation was listed as farming.

On May 12, 1863, he was taken prisoner

at Raymond, Mississippi, by the Army of Tennessee. One paper says "surrendered at Citronelle? by Lt. Gen. R. Taylor to E.R.S. Canby USA." Raymond was about 15 miles southwest of Jackson, Mississippi. Another paper said he was captured in the field near Vicksburg. He was sent to Memphis, Tennessee, on May 25, 1863, and from there was sent to the prison at Camp Morton, Indianapolis, Indiana. Camp Morton was named after Indiana's war governor Oliver P. Morton and was located at Nineteenth and Alabama Streets in Indianapolis. It was used in 1861 as a training camp for Indiana regiments and was taken over by the Federal Government in February of 1862 to house Confederate prisoners of war.

The *Memphis Commercial* published an article: "HORRORS OF CAMP MORTON: THE PICTURE OF SUFFERING AND HUNGER NOT OVERDRAWN---RATS AND CATS WERE TOOTHsome FOOD AND DOG MEAT COULD NOT BE BOUGHT--DESPAIR AND DEATH."

James remained at Camp Morton the remainder of the war. He took the oath of allegiance to the United States and was pardoned at Camp Morton and forwarded to City Point, Virginia, via Baltimore, Maryland, February 26, 1865, and from there to Jackson Mississippi, where he was paroled on May 19, 1865. They released him just about where they took him prisoner. I am assuming James had to walk the rest of the way home to Texas.

James and Mary had another daughter Minnie born about 1869 or 1870. I believe James died around this time also.

The William and Margaret Ann R. Veal Hogshead/Hogsett Family

Margaret Ann R. Veal was born March 14, 1815, in Tennessee and married William Hogshead who was born February 7, 1812, in Anderson County, Tennessee. They married October 22, 1833 in Knox County, Tennessee, and had six children, one son and five daughters.

When the youngest daughter was less than four months old her father William in June of 1846 enlisted in the Second Tennessee Infantry that was organized at Memphis to fight in the Mexican War. About the first of September 1846 while stationed at Camp Tennessee in Mexico across from Bunta, Mexico, William became so sick he ask for a leave of absence. He started for home on a boat and according to witnesses he made it as far as New Orleans he was put in a hospital and died ten days later on September 30, 1846.

In pension records it stated the children of William and Margaret were William McAdoo, Mary Jane (my great great grandmother), Ann Kirkpatrick, Sarah Elizabeth, Susan Wagoner, and Margaret L. Hogshead.

Between 1850 and 1853 Margaret moved to Hopkins County, Texas. It is believed that she came with her father and brothers and sisters. She bought on June 25, 1855, 100 acres of land on the waters of Stouts Creek which is a tributary of White Oak Creek. Margaret married Richard W. Hamilton and had two more sons, Richard W. and Andrew S. Hamilton. She is buried in the Old Saltillo Cemetery.

Shortly after their arrival the younger

generation of Hogshead changed the name from Hogshead to Hogsett.

William McAdoo Hogsett married Melissa Elizabeth Lyles in 1856 and then married Melvina F. Voss in 1870.

Mary Jane Hogsett married James O. Hamill April 10, 1859.

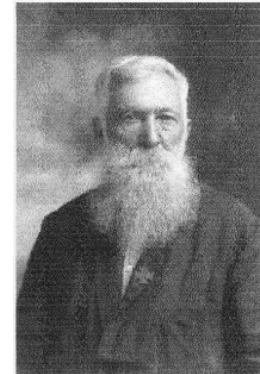
Sarah Elizabeth Hogsett married Thomas Jefferson Henley son of Hiram Henley.

Susan Wagoner Hogsett married Albert Hunter Barnes in 1860, then married Thomas C. Dodson in 1886. In 1896 she married Dr. John Abner Coppedge.

Margaret L. Hogsett married a Morris; then she married Walter Eddings and then Charles Beckner.

All these children married, raised families and died in Hopkins County with the exception of Margaret L. who lived in Morris County and is buried in the Old Omaha Cemetery there in Morris County.

This Hogshead family can be traced back to John Hogshead who was born in 1685, possibly in Scotland and who married Nancy Wallace who was born in 1689 possibly in Ireland. Both immigrated to America and died in Augusta County, Virginia.

Three Brothers From Alabama

According to Gerald Post's book Alive and Good to Know, three brothers moved to Texas from Pike County, Alabama, around 1868. Their parents were Jackson W. Courson who was born in 1815 in Georgia and died September 12, 1892, at Indian Creek, Bullock County, Alabama, and Mary Ann Cannon Courson who was born in 1830 in Georgia

or North Carolina. They married on December 12, 1838, in Pike County, Alabama. They had seven children, five sons and two daughters: John Holcomb, Augustus Evans (my great grandfather), Columbus Montgomery, Eliza L., Franklin Pierce, Martha A Luvisa and George Lafayette Courson.

Three of the brothers can be located on

the 1870 census of Hopkins County, Texas. John Holcomb and his family were living in Black Oak and my great grandfather Augustus was living in the household with his older brother. John enlisted in Co. G. Third Arkansas Regiment of the Confederate Army as a private and filed for his pension in Hopkins County in 1899.

In his application he stated that he had lived in Texas since 1868. Both John Holcomb Courson and his wife Nina are buried in the Como Cemetery.

Columbus Montgomery Courson on the 1870 census was living in the household of Hector Blue and his family. He had recently lost his wife Hortense to typhoid fever and his baby boy who died two months later. He moved back to Alabama, re-married, and then moved to Arkansas and is buried there in Hamburg, Ashley County. Columbus served in Co. B 53rd Alabama Cavalry also known as the Fifty-Third Partisan Rangers. He filed for his pension in 1913 in Ashley County, Arkansas.

My great grandfather Augustus Evans Courson on the 1880 census for Hopkins County, Texas, was living in the household of Mary Jane Hamill and her three daughters and working as a laborer. He married the oldest daughter Seletha Amelia Hamill on June 7, 1883. Of this union three sons were born, William Charles (Charlie) who was born in 1885 (my grandfather), John Veal was born in 1890 and Walter Augustus Barnes Courson was born in 1892.

Saletha and Augustus (Gus) inherited her mother's share of the old Hogsett farm and in 1894 they bought the rest from her uncle William McAdoo Hogsett and his sisters Ann Kirkpatrick Spence, Sarah Elizabeth Henley, Susan Wagner

Barnes and Margaret L. Eddings who later married Charles Beckner. The 100 acres of land was located directly across from the Old Pine Forest School House. Before the sale was even completed my great grandfather Augustus died on March 16, 1894. A grandson of Augustus, Charles Ray Courson, tells of family lore handed down that Augustus became sick while plowing in his fields. He left his horses that were attached to the plow and made it back to the house where he died possibly from a burst appendix. It was a couple of days later before anyone thought to check on the horses. They found them standing in the field where Augustus had left them. I have found one index card with the name "A. Courson" who enlisted in Co. 1, Third Regiment, European Brigade (Garde Francaise), Louisiana Militia, Confederate States, as a private. No dates. This made no sense to me. What would he be doing in Louisiana? Then I found his grandmother on the 1850 census living in Morehouse Parish, Louisiana. This is still a mystery to me. I still am not sure if this A. Courson is my Augustus or not.

William Charles Courson, the son of Augustus and Saletha, married Clara Lanore Irby in Franklin County, Texas, on April 29, 1913. They first made their home in Greenwood and then bought a farm west of Pine Forest from Lena Rettman. They raised peanuts, cotton, watermelons to feed the hogs, and peas that were dried to sell as seed. They had milk cows and sold milk to a local cheese factory in Sulphur Springs. They had several apple, peach, pear and fig trees. My grandmother also raised chickens. I once ask her what they did to make those fruit trees so productive and she told me she spread the chicken manure under the trees.

The Word: "Obituary"

The word "obituary" is derived from the Latin word for death, *obitus*, and the verb *obire* meaning "to die." Historically, in the Roman Catholic Church, an obituary was simply a list of the dead or a list of anniversary days for services commemorating the dead. In its modern meaning an obituary is not simply a notice that someone has died. In America today, death notices are published in the newspaper and are typically accompanied by a brief biographical sketch about the life of the person who has died. I do not know when this practice began, but it is somewhat ironic that an obituary is often as much about life as it is about death.

In days past, the role of the obituarist typically fell to newspaper editors or journalists specializing in local news. Certainly, in the days prior to mass literacy, such people were likely to be among the few people in a particular community who had the skills necessary to write a narrative about the deceased.

One can imagine the difficulties faced by the obituarist when he has little to go on and in some cases might not have known the deceased very well. Such a situation is ripe for exaggeration and the tendency to put the deceased's best foot forward, so to speak. Often the writer must rely on the survivors who may not necessarily have their facts straight either.

From this marriage three sons were born. Arion Frederick (my father) who was born in 1916, Leldon Lee, born in 1923, and Charles Ray Courson, born in 1932.

All three boys went to school in Pine Forest. Leldon would skip school and go play in the woods until time to go home. His father Charlie would find out about his skipping school from notes that principal Mitchell McClure would send home by Leldon's little brother Ray and Leldon would get

a licking from his father. Leldon finally caught on to how his father was finding out about his skipping school and he began searching Ray's pockets to make sure no more notes were sent home from the principal. Sometimes he would let Ray skip with him when he was roaming the woods in order to keep him quiet. He skipped school so much his father finally gave up and told him if he was not going to school he would put him to work plowing in the fields. This suited Leldon just fine.
